GRADUATE THEOLOGICAL EDUCATION

Graduate theological education is at the heart of what we do at MB Seminary. Whether it is at our campus in Langley, BC or in Winnipeg, MB, or online through the ACTS World Campus, our mission is to shape leaders theologically and formatively to lead Jesus' church.



One such leader is Johnny. Johnny is the pastor of Discipleship and Life Groups at Eastview Community Church in Winnipeg, Manitoba, and is working toward his Master of Arts in Christian Ministry at MB Seminary.

When asked how his seminary studies help him in his role, Johnny responded, "I often find that *what I am learning is directly applicable to the ministry I am involved in*. Whether it is learning new ways to engage with the Holy Spirit through prayer and scripture, understanding how to communicate complex theological ideas in simple terms, or diving deeper into biblical stories to unearth new meaning, *what I am learning inspires the ministry I am a part of at Eastview*.

IS THIS THE BEST GOD COULD DO?

"Because my brother and I grew up in a difficult family situation, I often asked why God could not help fix the difficult situation we were in. Without knowing it, I was expressing the classical formulation of the problem of evil: If God is good and all-powerful, why is there evil in the world?"

The most incisive indictment against Christianity resides in the notion of a God who created a world in which there is untold suffering and death. It raises the question "Is this the best God could do? "

In his latest book, *God Never Meant For Us to Die*, faculty member Dr. Pierre Gilbert expresses his dissatisfaction with the usual responses from Christian theologians and philosophers. That dissatisfaction drove him into a careful investigation of the creation account, which would provide the key to this thorny question, namely that the injunction not to eat of the tree of the knowledge of good and evil was, in fact, a curse and blessing formula.

This book, a result of a very personal journey, is a response to the problem of evil that unconditionally affirms the goodness and power of God. It is available at amazon.ca and other online retailers.

MEDICAL ASSISTANCE IN DYING

How can we uphold our theological position of "no" while engaging within a culture of people who are saying "yes"?

Our new medium for engaging in topics of faith and life relevant to our churches and community, **NAVIGATE** seeks to open dialogue on critical issues that intersect church and culture. One such critical issue is **Medical Assistance in Dying (MAiD)**.

You might be surprised to learn that a recent poll suggested that 80 percent of Canadians believe it should be easier to make their own end-of-life decisions. The poll also reported that 33 percent describe themselves as "enthusiastic supporters," while another 48 percent "cautiously support" the idea of ending life through medical assistance. These findings alert us to the reality that MAiD is being viewed in increasingly more positive ways. It is impacting people we know in our workplaces, neighbourhoods, and even our churches, and better preparation is needed for conversations with those exploring its possibilities.

As Mennonite Brethren, we affirm that all life is a gift from God and belongs to God (as expressed in Article 14 of the MB Confession of Faith). So how can we uphold our theological position of "no" while engaging within a culture of people who are saying "yes"?

As part of our Navigate series, MB Seminary recently hosted a live event featuring three faculty presentations and a panel discussion. Dr. Doug Heidebrecht and Dr. Brian Cooper offered thoughts on the biblical and theological implications of life, death, and suffering from an MB perspective. They were followed by Dr. Gloria Woodland's presentation which bridged the gap between our theological conclusions and the reality of walking alongside those impacted by MAiD. These presentations, along with questions submitted by online participants, *began a rich conversation of faith and life within our MB community*.

BY THE NUMBERS


2020 brought many challenges, including the need to quickly innovate classrooms and community instruction. *But it also brought many blessings*. With the help of the ACTS World Campus, almost all of our graduate theological education pivoted online. NAVIGATE enriched our MB family through a virtual conversation on a relevant issue, and our online devotionals sent through email and social media encouraged many.



FINANCIAL SNAPSHOT

Your financial support makes our mission possible! Educating and equipping men and women who lead the church and share the good news of Jesus is only possible with your continued financial partnership. When we partner together, your support enables us to live out our mission of making the Seminary and its resources available to every interested pastor and individual in an MB church across Canada and around the world.

As we approach our fiscal year-end on May 31, 2021, we continue to work toward financial sustainability. Last spring, our Board of Directors initiated a 24-month Financial Restructuring Plan, requiring \$375,000 to be cut from the operating budget over two years, thereby aligning the Seminary's revenues with its expenditures. We are confident that this plan will lead to a sustainable and stable financial future.



We are grateful for the strong financial support received from across the country; thank you! As of December 31, 2020, revenues have exceeded budget. Thank you for your generosity! However, we still require \$140,000 to meet our 2020/21 budget and an additional \$200,000 to meet our sustainability goals in the next 2 years. Your continued financial support is vital and necessary to make *shaping leaders and changing lives* possible.

YOUR GIFT MATTERS

Why give to MB Seminary? When you give to MB Seminary:


